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

Trinity Blesses Community Organizations with \$500,000

In every season, Trinity has sought to be a blessing. Committed to serving the underprivileged, the church established Care Community Services Society (CCSS) in 1996. A 2018 and 2020 President's Challenge recipient, CCSS operates as a registered charity offering programs for children, youth, the elderly, families, and ex-offenders.

During the 2009 financial crisis, Trinity also took bold steps to help the affected, including a donation of \$100,000 to assist financially-challenged families and individuals. The church's youth also demonstrated a heart for the community that year by organizing a charity concert that raised over \$222,000 for the Straits Times School Pocket Money Fund.

An Extraordinary Greeting

As part of our 50th Anniversary Celebrations, a special afterservice segment was held on August 29 to honor Trinity's past, celebrate the present, and look forward to the future.

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


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APAGF Zooms in on Pandemic Impact at First Virtual Meeting

Our leaders from APAGF gathered for a time to encourage, share and update on how our churches are moving forward in the pandemic.

The global pandemic and travel restrictions notwithstanding, the General Councils in the Asia Pacific Assemblies of God Fellowship (APAGF) were determined that their annual meeting proceeded. It was more important than ever to come together to encourage one another, and share updates, experiences and resources. God's mandate needs to be fulfilled even when the world is reeling from the impact of COVID-19.

Instead of meeting in Vietnam, 57 participants from seven different time zones gathered on Zoom for the first virtual APAGF meeting on July 22 and 23.

Besides the General Superintendents (GSs) meeting, there were three other meetings – Next Generation, National Bible Schools and National Missions.

Topping the agenda was the impact of the pandemic on churches in the region. Led by Rev Dominic Yeo, Chairman of APAGF, the GSs also shared how churches were coping with worship services being shifted online. All agreed that the Church must keep up with the changing times and be equipped to deal with pastoring in a pandemic.

Backed by a firm belief that prayer is even more vital at such a time as this, the APAGF executives will gather the region for a Concert of Prayer in September. It will also be a time of equipping pastors and leaders and training for the churches.

Helmed by Rev Gerald Tan, Asia Pacific representative of World AG Next Generation Commission, the Asia Pacific Next Generation chapter met for the third year running. The AP Next Generation Leadership Gathering in May 2020 had to be canceled because of COVID-19. However, the Next Generation team intends to leverage technology to hold next year's event in different countries to mitigate the restriction of international travel.

At the second meeting of National Bible Schools, eight representatives shared how classes had to go online. They also agreed on the need for the region's seminaries to collaborate more creatively by sharing digital resources.

The focus of the first meeting of National Missions directors was on building relationships across the missions network for greater collaboration and partnership. Special thanks go to Rev Brad Walz, Rev Jeff Hartensveld and Rev Michael Dissanayake for attending the meeting despite the unfavorable timings. Their presence and contribution are greatly appreciated.

The Challenge to Advance

It was an honor to have Rev David Hall from Lifepoint Church Adelaide, Australia. He preached on tapping into the Spirit and challenged ministers of the next generation to advance in this digital age. Rev David spoke from 1 Corinthians 2 and spurred all NGC ministers and volunteers to not only to preach and teach the Word of God but also demonstrate the power of God in our generation, just as Jesus did then. He spoke on how we can do ministry with the power of the Holy Spirit right now, during COVID-19. We may not be able to gather physically, but God has the power to move in every realm, both physical and digital.

His empowering Word was followed up by an exclusive interview facilitated by Ps Isaiah Fadzlin. It was a dynamic session where many were enriched by Rev David's replies.

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AG General Council Meeting

Persevering in Our Mandate to Move – Not an ordinary meeting but one which called for the Father's business.

It was hard to know what to expect at this year's AG General Council Meeting (September 10), without our usual vibrant praise-filled atmosphere, expressive worship and Spirit-inspired prayers, to which we are so accustomed. It was the first time for many attending an AGM via video-conferencing.

Rev Dr Chia Beng Hock called to order, what at first seemed like just another business meeting, but under unique circumstances. Under the legal provisions of COVID-19 Temporary Measure Act 2020, the acceptance of reports, election and re-election of officials had been executed through a proxy form. The Annual Report and Financial statements in both soft and hard copies had been sent prior to the meeting and had been made available to members since August 19, 2020. Also provided for under the COVID-19 Temporary Member Regulation, the Chairman of the meeting has been appointed to act in proxy for all members. A member who had matters to raise had to post or email the chairman before the meeting. Also, as the meeting was online, members were not required to propose or second resolutions.

Remembering our Mandate to Move

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Opening in prayer, General Superintendent, Rev Dominic Yeo set a firm spiritual tone for the rest of the meeting with an authoritative exhortation from Mark 4:35-41. He reminded us that our God is a God of movement, who is never satisfied with the 'status-quo'. He is concerned for other communities and just like the first disciples, we are to obey the voice of our Lord, look beyond our immediate challenges and minister beyond our immediate communities to 'go to the other side' with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

A Prophetic Destiny and Destination

First, he exhorted lead and senior pastors, stressing that as they weather the storm, facing demonic challenges and crises in life does not mean they can never get to the other side. They are to persist despite the storm. He asserted, "While this side may be a side of challenges, the other side is a side of fulfillment. While this may be a side of storm, the other side is one of quiet confidence. While this side may be a side of great crisis, the other side is a side of great victory." Facing such challenges and crises, means they and their churches are 'on the right track' for a prophetic destiny and destination.

Fulfilling our Mandate with our Eyes on Jesus

Next, addressing all as a denomination, Rev Dominic exhorted us to keep our eyes focused on Jesus and on the other side. He reminded us that going over is our mandate and we are to look beyond the pandemic. Our congregants are watching how we rekindle our faith and trust in Jesus. We inspire them when we persevere. The Kingdom is advancing and going over is a matter of destiny to which God has destined us, the AG Singapore and AG worldwide.

Resolving to Move with Due Diligence

The first resolution was to accept the Auditors reports for 2019. Rev Chia reported on two questions that had arisen from the floor and how they had been satisfactorily addressed. Voting for the resolution had been done by proxy earlier. The vote had been unanimously passed to accept the Auditor's Report.

Resolving to Stand Strong and Stand Up to Serve

The second resolution was to re-elect two current members and to elect two new members to the EXCO. Rev Simon Ang was re-elected as Assistant General Superintendent and Rev Tan Hock Cheng as General Secretary. Rev Jason Tan and Rev Bernadette Fan were both elected and welcomed as new members to the EXCO.

Honoring His Faithful Servants on the Move

Rev Dominic honored three veterans who were stepping down to make more room for renewal in the EXCO.

Rev Robert Lum has served with distinction but felt it was a good time to step off the plate for the renewal process. Serving in EXCO since 1996, he held the following offices: EXCO member 1996-1997, 2017-2019, General Treasurer 1997-1998, General Secretary 2000-2001 and Assistant General Superintendent 2002-2016.

Dr Emily Tan had served as an EXCO member and as an important voice for Chinese-speaking churches, from 2004-2009; 2012; 2014-2019. She is in transition to go back to Malaysia.

Rev Gerald Tan had served as an outstanding EXCO member from 2013-2015, and again from 2017-2019. He shared how it was his joy, pleasure and honor to serve the larger body in this capacity but also delighted to step-off to make room for others this season.

Flowing with the Larger Move of the Spirit

Wrapping-up, Rev Dominic called for us to join AG churches all across the Asia-Pacific in corporate prayer at the end of September. He further encouraged us to stay closely connected to the larger AG body through a conference in October. The Christmas Interruption

The Earth Interrupted: The Salvation Story

Interruptions to the norm could be good in many ways. Such was the interruption by God to planet Earth.

Rev Winnie Ong brought a strong teaching on how divine interruption to Earth was necessary for the salvation of mankind.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit the world in early 2020, it bounced out of control. By mid-September, WHO reported 213 countries and territories having over 30 million confirmed cases of infection, and over 950,000 deaths.* COVID-19 interrupted the world without warning. It came to hurt, not to heal; it came to destroy, not to save.

For all its beauty and splendor, Earth and its 7 billion occupants face horrifying interruptions in many forms and severity—tsunamis, volcanic eruptions, hurricanes, fire, and floods, etc. Besides natural disasters, people and wildlife experience drought and famine, pollution and pestilence. The Apostle Paul describes earth's troubles this way: "We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time." (Romans 8:22)

God Interrupts Earth to Create

Not all disruptions are unwelcomed. The Bible reveals that planet Earth was not beautiful or perfect at the start. It was formless, empty, and dark (Genesis 1:2). Then God entered the picture and made earth habitable for all life forms. He proclaimed with joy, "Let there be light... let there be..." and transformed a dark and watery planet into the functional and beautiful blue planet teeming with life forms in its sky, land, and water. He made earth turn on its axis 24/7 and have the sun, moon and stars regulate times and seasons. Angelic beings rejoiced at God's creation.

The Creator looked at His own work and approved each item He had called into being or shaped with His hands. They were perfect as He breathed life into them. The crowning glory was in creating the first human beings, a male and a female so that they too would populate the earth. They are at the top of the hierarchy of life forms because they are special beings. Unlike other life forms, the first humans are spirit beings with a soul, and a body made from earth itself.

The Chinese must have known this part of human history. In their written language, the single word for boat 船 is composed of three separate words: 舟 (boat), 八 (eight), and \square (mouths). The word itself speaks of salvation of a family when God made Earth new once again.

The Creator repopulated the air, the sea and land with reserved pairs of male and female animals. He interrupted earth with a deluge to save it and give it a new lease of life.

God Interrupts Earth to Redeem

About 2,000 years ago, God re-entered the world. This time the Creator interrupted earth in a supernatural conception.

"The angel answered (Mary), 'The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. Therefore also the holy one who is born from you will be called the Son of God.'" (Luke 1:35)

Girl Interrupted: The Mary Story

Mary's world turned upside down when the Lord's angel visited her and told her she would give birth to the Savior. Rev Grace Ong, feeling like Mary, shares how challenging situations brought upheaval to her life, and how God turned it around.

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times...it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair." – Charles Dickens

The Best of Times: Great Expectations!

2020 found me at the start of a new season as a returned missionary, pioneering a new migrant church in Singapore. It promised to be a milestone year. We just moved to a new home of our own. My son would take the 0-levels. My father would turn 70 this year. Our GOSEA 2010-2020 missions project would celebrate the end of a 10-year vision. I just graduated with a Master of Divinity from ACTS College. My calendar was full of mission trips schedules. We were on the threshold of the best of times.

When the angel came to Mary and called her highly favored, there must have been such a different expectation in her heart than what was to follow. I am sure most of you, like me, started out 2020 with great expectations of increase, promotion and favor.

In February 2020, God answered our prayer and provided a dream venue for our church-plant. It was strategic, affordable, and tastefully furnished. We paid the deposit and were so excited for the big move to our Promised Land.

The Worst of Times: A Hot Mess!

And then COVID-19 broke out. All churches had to cancel their services. The Circuit Breaker started on the week of our planned move. We had to switch to a Zoom church instead. Then, my mother was hospitalized for pneumonia. Next, my father, Rev Andrew Ong, was diagnosed with shingles with excruciating nerve pain. We were in hospital three times a week. Dad's shingles resulted in Bell's Palsy, a temporary paralysis of his face. His 70th birthday was coming, but he could not even smile fully. This was not the grand birthday celebration our family envisioned. He had to host the ASSM (ACTS School of Supernatural Ministry) in July, and here he was in the greatest need of a supernatural miracle himself.

On the ministry front, our missions were in crisis. The pandemic badly hit Southeast Asia and many of our missions cities were in lockdown. All schools were closed. Our primary missions support base was through our preschool SonShine Kids International in the Philippines, and most of our missionaries were tent-making teachers in Southeast Asia. All had no work, rentals had to be paid, and no one could come home because the airlines canceled all flights. Then we received the distressing news that one of our church-planters in Cebu was infected with COVID-19. Cebu was a hotspot of the rapid spread in the Philippines. The whole pastoral team in one of our churches had to be quarantined.

Mary, after the angelic visitation, found herself pregnant out of wedlock, having to leave her hometown and give birth in a stable. It brought her great inconvenience and discomfort, and to the onlookers, she probably appeared very "suay" or disfavored. It almost seemed the angel brought bad news and life was a hot mess.

Times of Divine Interruptions: Signal of His Control

Thankfully, God's divine interruptions in our lives signal His control. What appears detrimental to our plans may end up desirable to His purposes.

I witnessed the miraculous recovery of my parents as many joined us in fervent prayer. Instead of canceling the ASSM course, God sent my father a team to bring the ASSM online and to our biggest surprise, there were more than a thousand students! We witnessed not only the miracle of Papa's healing, but the ASSM became a platform for many miracles of healing during this pandemic. Someone brain-dead woke up from his coma the next morning after prayer! I got the news that our pastors' COVID-19 results were negative, and our stricken pastor recovered completely. The Almighty God is truly the God of miracles, both instant and gradual. Being forced online, I saw the biggest batch of students in the history of ASSM being activated in the gifts of the Spirit!

In the mission-field, I felt a divine inspiration to bring our entire Bible School and preschool in the Philippines online. It seemed incredulous as preschoolers were so restless. The internet in the Philippines was very unstable and our teachers, untrained. Yet God enabled us to arrange two weeks of intense re-training of our teachers and by July, we could start summer and regular online classes with 160 kids in Lapu-Lapu City with 12 online classes every day!

In July, we finally moved into our new church premises. Despite the safety protocols and restricted services, we saw the salvation of three Filipina migrant workers after our re-opening. We persevere in our vision to be a blessing to the migrant workers in Singapore.

Our Response: Interrupt Me, Lord!

Looking back at the turbulent months, God birthed new modes of doing ministry and gave us a new expectation of the miraculous. He re-equipped us, shook us out of our old, over-familiar wineskins and made us dependent on Him.

Mary's response to the angel touched me immensely. Despite her troubled thoughts, she said in Luke 1:28, "I am the Lord's servant, may your Word to me be fulfilled." God fulfills His Word in ways beyond our imagination. My prayer this Christmas is, "Interrupt me, Lord. I am your servant. May your Word to me be fulfilled your Way."

The Christmas Interruption

Man Interrupted: The Joseph Story

Joseph's marriage plan was interrupted by the inception of Jesus. What lessons could we learn from this? Rev Lawrence Koo writes.

The Context

This is how Jesus the Messiah was born. His mother, Mary, was engaged to be married to Joseph. But before the marriage took place, while she was still a virgin, she became pregnant through the power of the Holy Spirit. Joseph, to whom she was engaged, was a righteous man and did not want to disgrace her publicly, so he decided to break the engagement quietly. As he considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream. "Joseph, son of David," the angel said, "do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife. For the child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit. And she will have a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." All of this occurred to fulfill the Lord's message through his prophet: "Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel, which means 'God is with us.'" When Joseph woke up, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded and took Mary as his wife. But he did not have sexual relations with her until her son was born. And Joseph named him Jesus. (Matthew 1:18-25)

At the start of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Singapore government imposed the Circuit Breaker in early April. Many couples had to either cancel or postpone their wedding plans as a result. To them, COVID-19 was a huge interrupter! All the efforts put into planning a dream wedding seemed to have gone to waste. One can imagine the frustration and disappointment these couples felt because of something totally unexpected and beyond their control. But even what they went through paled in comparison to Joseph's experience.

Joseph in Shock

In the Scriptures, we learned that Joseph was engaged to his sweetheart, Mary. In the Jewish custom, an engagement was considered a marriage except without consummation. Joseph must have been counting the days and looking forward to the big day. But nothing could have shocked him more than when he found out Mary was pregnant!

The conversation between Joseph and Mary could have gone something like this:

"Mary, how could you be unfaithful to me? What have I done to deserve this?" "Joseph, please listen to me. I have not been unfaithful to you. You are the only man I love. Trust me!"

"Trust you? How can I trust you when all I can see is your protruding tummy? Tell me who's the man who did this to you!?"

"No one, Joseph. This pregnancy was an act of God. The child was conceived by the Holy Spirit."

"What? Mary, I think you've either lost your mind or you're taking me for an idiot to think I could believe what you've just said." And Joseph left, utterly angry and confused.

Is there any couple out there whose marriage plan has turned out as bad as Joseph's? I think not. Joseph's marriage plan met with an interception, not just an interruption. However, as a righteous man, and with his deep love for Mary, he did not want to shame Mary publicly, so he decided to break the engagement quietly (Matthew 1:19). But God intervened. Joseph had a dream. In that dream, an angel appeared to him and said, "Joseph, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife. For the child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit. And she will have a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." (Matthew 1:20-21)

Joseph woke up from that incredulous dream feeling puzzled and bewildered. Nevertheless, he was glad that what Mary had told him was not a lie. His secret plan of breaking the marriage was divinely interrupted, and his love and trust for Mary was restored. He went ahead with his marriage plan and took Mary as his wife. It was, however, ceremonial in nature. His physical intimacy with his lawfully-wedded wife faced an interruption—he had to observe sexual distancing for one year!

The interruptions Joseph experienced were not without a purpose, however. They served to bring about the fulfillment of the prophecies of the promised Messiah, which led to the invasion of the Savior into this lost world!

All of this occurred to fulfill the Lord's message through his prophet: "Look! The virgin will conceive a child! She will give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel, which means 'God is with us.'" (Matthew 1: 22-23)

What can we learn from Joseph's story?

Firstly, life's events do not always go according to our plan.

There are happenings that are beyond our control. We must learn to accept situations that are far from ideal. No one expected COVID-19 to come our way. For many of us, we see COVID-19 as a mega interrupter. All our plans have come to a halt. There is absolutely nothing we can do.

Secondly, our plans must give way to God's purpose.

I am sure many people are feeling frustrated because their plans are interrupted or have come to naught because of the COVID-19 pandemic. But as God's children, we must remember nothing happens without a reason, no matter how unpleasant it may be. Romans 8:28 says, "And we know that God causes everything to work together for the good of those who love God and are called according to his purpose for them."

At the end of the day, God's purpose will prevail. Nothing can prevent God's salvation plan for mankind from happening, not even a COVID-19 pandemic. The Christmas story is a perfect example. So be encouraged and remember that even in interruptions, we are partners with God in His plans and purpose!

Shepherds Interrupted: The Outcasts Story

Heaven in the highest reached out to the shepherds in their lowest, in unexpected circumstances and their lives were changed forever. Rev Charles Tan encourages us to learn from the shepherds' responses.

In this pandemic, all of us experience the need to adjust to changes. So did people at the first advent of Christ. As the title indicates, the passage is best taken from Luke 2:8-20. Here we can clearly see the revelation of Christ's birth given to the shepherds, the rejoicing of the heavenly host, the shepherds' response, the result of their obedience and their return with great rejoicing.

The Revelation

Without any expectations, suddenly, out of the dark, the angel of the Lord appeared before the shepherds with his glory shining upon them. They stood in awe and gripped with great fear with what they saw. They were interrupted in their normal routine of life. The angel told them not to fear and announced the birth of a Savior, Christ the Lord. Like the shepherds, many of us continued life as usual and kept busy until COVID-19 brought life to a halt.

Pause to reflect. Some of us may have fears about our health, family, job security, the economy, or world conditions. But let this season remind us of the Savior and that we do not have to be afraid.

That such divine visitation would ever come to the shepherds instead of to royalties or religious groups of the day is unthinkable. For shepherds were considered the outcasts, who were despised, mistrusted, and not allowed into the temple. Religion looked at them as people without hope. Not so for God. The angel announced the birth of the Lamb of God to men raising sacrificial lambs is so relevant as Jesus came for the outcast. Health care, nourishment, accommodation to the outcasts become important in this pandemic. God had heard their cry. "Sing to the LORD! Give praise to the LORD! He rescues the life of the needy from the hands of the wicked." (Jeremiah 20:13)

The Rejoicing

A great multitude of heavenly host appeared praising God, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men!" Christ came "to preach the gospel to the poor, to heal the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed and proclaim the acceptable year of the LORD." (Luke 4:18-19).

The Response

The shepherds talked among themselves after the angels had left them. Could they be questioning the validity of such angelic visitation, to leave the sheep

in danger, or find any excuses that would have held them back? Though it interrupted them from their normal activities, they went in haste to seek what the angel had announced. They went searching stable after stable until they found the one where a child had been born. How they responded made all the difference.

They found Mary, Joseph, and the baby lying in the manger as they had been told. They had gone from the most exalted of heavenly sights to the humblest of earthly ones. From a dramatically lit sky to a dimly lit stable, the smell of animals and the atmosphere were familiar and a welcome for them.

The Result

They came, they saw Him, they knew His name and were changed forever. They became the first evangelists. They went about proclaiming what they had heard and seen without any skills or special gifts. They simply acted on what they believed. All those who heard them marveled at those things they told.

The Return

After seeing the wondrous sights and proclaiming the message, they returned to the ordinary. That is true for us each year, for the celebration of Christmas is a special time. But when the fun and excitement is over, we must return to our jobs and our responsibilities. But the shepherds returned so full of what had happened in their lives that they could not keep themselves from sharing the good news with everyone they met. With hearts filled with praise, they worshiped and glorified God.

Whatever trials we have gone through or are still in transition due to the pandemic, let us be like the shepherds. Our normal routine is interrupted. Allow God to do a deeper work in, for and through us for such a time as this. Let us look forward to 2021 with great anticipation that all things do work for good to those who love Him.

Let me pray for you: Lord, let us learn from the shepherds. Grant us that we may hear where You would entrust with such a great revelation. Remove the fear and speak the words of Your presence to save. Give us searching hearts like the shepherds, who left their work to scour the barns of Bethlehem until they found You. That we be so changed and return to where You have placed us as Your witnesses who are filled with praise and joy in Your Name. In Christ's name, we asked. Amen!

After a week or two of praying and believing in God, not knowing if I would get the job, I finally received the job offer with a higher-than-market-rate increment.

I could not believe my ears when I first received the call. I want to thank God for everything that He has done for me. I had expected that it would take me a long time before I could find a good job opportunity but indeed this has proven that nothing is impossible with God—not even in the worst of times in this pandemic!

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From Hopeless Drug Addict to Hardworking Student

God and my friends in Teen Challenge partnered together to effect a change in me! By Rino Koh Teng Sheng, Teen Challenge Singapore

Hello, I'm Rino and I am 32 years old this year. After going through the vicious cycle of a drug addict, I am proud to share that I am free from drug abuse for five years, three years due to incarceration, through the strength and grace of God.

Addicted Since Secondary School

I started taking drugs when I was in secondary school. I remember my so-called "friends" encouraging me to try it with them. In order to blend in, I started to have my first high, enjoying the out-of-body experience along with the friendships. I was introduced to even more friends and enjoyed the attention I got from it. Then, I started to try out different drugs. It became an addiction. However, I failed to recognize it as one. Before I knew it, I started to drift away from my family. I also avoided people who advised me against drugs. My health took a hit, and I was hospitalized a few times. It also affected my studies and eventually I was expelled from school. The first time I got caught by the police was when I was accompanying a friend to do some loan shark activities. I went out on bail and again was caught when I was screened while hanging out in the void deck with my friends.

Imprisoned by Drugs

Eventually I went into a Drug Rehabilitation Centre at age 21 for my first drug offence. By God's grace, I was given the lightest sentence and entered Teen Challenge (TC) for a prerelease program. At that time, I was rebellious, only thinking of ways to break the law. My initial impression of TC was that it was just a place that I was sent to. I didn't want to change. The staff treated me well. After I was released, I went into the vicious cycle of playing with drugs again. As I did not change my circle of friends, I went in for a second time at 24 and a third time at 27. The third time, I was too ashamed to face God and ask for forgiveness.

The Turning Point

Then one day, God's presence suddenly filled me and comforted me when I needed Him most. I started to reflect

upon my life and thought about my future. The thought of my family members passing away while I was still stuck in this vicious cycle of prison brought fear to me. I did not want to be in a situation where I had to attend the funerals of my family members in chains. I started to change. I started praying and reading the Bible every day. I began to renounce myself from the gang and slowly drifted away from bad influence. It was tough as people would judge and make fun of me. However, these were pains that I had to go through to grow stronger in Christ.

A New Start at Teen Challenge

Due to good behavior in prison, I was given a chance to choose which halfway house to go to. I chose TC. I decided to be on my best behavior this second time there. However, not every resident had the same goal to be transformed in Christ. Some even tempted me with different things. However, God is great. He placed many positive people around me—volunteers, staff and inmates, who never failed to support me. It was a struggle but these two verses helped me pull through, "If God is for us, who can be against us?" (Romans 8:31) and "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13).

At TC, I had acquired the habit to connect with God daily through quiet time, and weekly Sunday services. Life after TC wasn't a bed of roses, but it's much better than drugs and prison. I also started to enjoy healthier relationships with my family. It doesn't mean that once we believe in God, we'll have a good life immediately. God will continue to grind us and strengthen us daily, so that one day we'd be ready to receive His will and blessings. Currently, God has been kind to allow me to upgrade myself with a driving license and also a sponsored diploma in Kaplan. I pray that God will continue His blessings and provide me with a sponsored degree.

I thank God the staff of TC for their continuous, steadfast support that has allowed me to get to where I am today.

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The Butterfly Story

The loss of a newborn. A contracted disease. A journey through depression. A story of life, loss, and transformation. By Mey Chan, Trinity Christian Centre

In October 2018, I was jolted awake with a message in my mind – "Go take a pregnancy test"

Really, God? At the age of 44?

The test was positive—a wonderful surprise for my husband and me. We named our baby Noah. In the days to come, God continued to drop many words into my mind. I kept a journal to remember the promises. As time went by, the messages started to feel heavier. "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or discouraged" (1 Chronicles 22:13). I had an inkling the journey would not be easy.

Crash Landing

At week 10, we revisited the doctor. The results of the first scan were disturbing. The doctor advised us that our baby had a high risk of Trisomy 13—a genetic disorder that causes facial deformations and the under-development of major organs. Subsequent tests and scans further confirmed that our baby's heart, brain, and face had many abnormalities.

We were crushed. But we knew that terminating our baby was not a choice. We would do our best to take good care of God's gift to us. Yet, we constantly wrestled with our decision. In the storm of negative reports, we clung on to God's promises.

The Rainbow

God saw that we were struggling with our skeptical doctors so He made a divine connection. Damien's brother introduced us to a well-respected geneticist. She helped us find a new team of doctors who greatly respected and supported our decision.

Arrival and Farewell

Baby Noah arrived a month early. Despite the doctors' warnings that he would be a "blue baby" (with no cries nor the ability to breathe), he came out crying loudly. We had eight precious hours with him until he peacefully slipped away in my arms. We were beyond sad. At the same time, we felt unspeakable joy and peace. Joy unshakable. Peace in the midst of suffering. Inexplicable yet so real.

Our little boy brought great joy and delight to many. We changed. People around us changed too. Baby Noah taught us to treasure life.

In the Cocoon

In September 2019, I was diagnosed with severe depression and anxiety. Psychiatric medicines did not work for me and doctors were making little headway. In desperation, we cried out. *God, have You abandoned us?*

God may have seemed silent, but He never left us. He sent many people to remind us that we were not alone. Family, friends, godly people—they all prayed relentlessly for us. They also supported us in practical ways and cheered us on.

Out of Darkness

One day, I was introduced to a therapist who asked me, "Are you ready to let God take full control? Do you trust Him? Do you trust Him to use me? Joy and peace belong to you. You are an eagle. Fly high and take them back."

Step by step, in hope and trust, I worked hard on my road to recovery. The mind and the body healing in tandem.

Transformation

Today, I am fully recovered and better than before. I share my experiences and journey with others who are in similar struggles. I want to let people know they have hope! God is the ultimate cure. Complete healing comes from the Healer.

Many say mental illness will be a cycle for life. You never know when it may hit you again.

I asked God if this was true. Shortly after, a butterfly flew into our house and I started noticing posts of butterflies on social media.

God reminded me of a law in nature: a butterfly will never become a caterpillar again. It remains a butterfly—transformed from its former self.

In that moment, I knew. I will never cycle back into the same mental illness again. I am completely healed, transformed by my Creator.

To all who may be in a cocoon of sorts at the moment, know that you do not need to fear. Know that you are never alone. Joy and peace. They belong to you. Always.

The World Interrupted: The Faithfulness of God

ace masks, social distancing, economic recession, work from home, home-based learning, online church services... all of this translates to stress, frustration and spiritual fatigue. During this pandemic, all of us have lost something. We've all lost a certain amount of our personal freedom and had our lifestyles impacted in ways that frustrate and debilitate. Some of us have lost income or even a job.

2020 will forever be etched in history as a year of promise that quickly turned into a year of pandemonium. There has been so much pain and suffering in the world brought about by the pandemic and economic fallout. So much heartbreak. And sometimes that's all we can see. And we ask ourselves, "God, why does it have to be this way?"

For most of us, our default position is almost always the same when it comes to pain and sadness, difficulty and challenge: self-pity, self-preoccupation and self-concern. We don't think about the good that could come of it, much less how it might positively affect other people. Our goal is for people to feel sorry for us, sympathize with us and feel our pain. And then, for us to wallow in it: To focus on all we don't have, can't do, isn't going our way and how we've been inconvenienced.

The question then is how can we survive spiritually in a pandemic world? For me it's simply learning to look at life through the *faithfulness of God.*

These are the words that Thomas Obadiah Chisholm wrote in the great hymn Great is Thy Faithfulness...

Great is Thy faithfulness, O God my Father!
There is no shadow of turning with Thee;
Thou changest not, Thy compassions, they fail not:
As Thou hast been Thou forever wilt be.

And this is the chorus...

Great is Thy faithfulness, great is Thy faithfulness, Morning by morning new mercies I see; All I have needed Thy hand hath provided— Great is Thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me!

Virtually every line of this great hymn is pulled from the Scripture, and it reminds us of how the God we serve is faithful in every way—even when things don't work out exactly as we would like, we can see His hand at work in every moment of every day.

The Psalmist David's praise of the faithfulness of God in Psalms 145 is an attitude we should cultivate to survive this pandemic. May I humbly submit three important truths for us to consider.

FIRSTLY.

Focus on the Faithfulness of God.

When you read the Bible, you encounter again and again examples of God's faithfulness to His people. He makes His promises, and He keeps His promises. Psalm 145:13 says, "The Lord is trustworthy in all he promises and faithful in all he does."

This doesn't mean that His people will never have problems, or never face hard times. What it does mean is that we can be sure that no matter what we face, God will see us through.

When Thomas Obadiah Chisholm sat down to write this hymn, the Word of God just flowed out of his heart onto the page, because the Word was so deeply ingrained in his spirit that he could not see his life from any other perspective—even though his life hadn't always been a bed of roses.

SECONDLY,

Meditate on His works.

David said in Psalm 145:5, "I will meditate on your wonderful works."

When you look at the world around us, you'll find nothing but a fallen mess, a world gone wrong. But in God's creation we see signs of His faithfulness everywhere.

God is faithful to His Word, faithful to His promise, faithful to His people. Just like the light of dawn follows the darkest hour of the night, God is faithful to lead you out of your darkness into His marvelous light.

Make it your habit to focus on goodness where goodness exists, to focus on beauty where beauty exists, to look for any reason—any excuse—to celebrate God's faithfulness.

THIRDLY,

Revel in the nearness of God.

David wrote in Psalm 145:18, "The Lord is near to all who call on him."

In the third verse of this great hymn, Thomas Chisholm wrote...
Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth,
Thine own dear presence to cheer and to guide,
Strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow—
Blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside!

This is about so much more than just having your sins washed away. It's about living each day reveling in His presence, experiencing His peace, His power, His victory, His hope—in spite of the circumstances. Learn to stop venting and start praying because we don't need sympathy, we need strength for each new day! It begins with a willingness to revel in the nearness of God and say, "God, I need you. I need your help. I need your mercy. I need your presence in my life."

Let us never lose sight of the faithfulness of God: the wonder of mercy, the beauty of creation, the truth of God's Word.

As we close this chapter in this chaotic year, we can embrace the new year secured in hope, anticipation, expectation and faith because of the faithfulness of God.
